

Newsletter "Beyond Canon" – July / August 2019

Dear Fellows and Friends,

July was quite a busy month for us in Regensburg with a conference, a workshop, wonderful guests and papers at our Fellows' Lunches – and all the usual efforts at the end of an academic year. Before we head off to our summer break, we want to give you a brief update about our Centre.

1. Review: Activities of our Group in July

On the first day of July, our **Centre celebrated its official opening** with our <u>International</u> <u>Conference "Extracanonical Traditions"</u>. With more than 20 speakers from 10 countries (amongst them 14 Fellows of our Centre), we gained impressive insights into the development of the Holy Land into a "sacred topography" (or even a "sacred geology") through texts, rituals, and material culture. The proceedings will be published in the "Studien und Texte zu Antike und Christentum" series at Mohr Siebeck, Tübingen. We have attached Jan Bremmer's summary and a few impressions from our Conference – hoping that you will enjoy the pictures!

From July 18-20, our Centre co-organised the <u>International Workshop</u> "The History of the <u>Byzantine Liturgy of the Hours and the Horologion</u>" with **Harald Buchinger's Chair for Liturgical Studies** – with an outstanding list of participants. The workshop began with major methodological presentations by Stig Frøyshov, Stefano Parenti, and Georgi Parpulov, as well as individual texts presented by Natalia Smelova, Daniel Galadza, Gabriel Radle, Ramez Mikhail, and Alexander Lingas. The intense discussions over three full days emphasized the need to continue editing and publishing sources of the Horologion, and to work on a checklist of the earliest Byzantine Rite Horologion manuscripts, of which there are currently nineteen known manuscripts copied before 1100 CE.

In addition to these two major events, we heard a series of very interesting papers here during the last few weeks:
